We are grateful for the opportunity to live, work, and gather on this land.



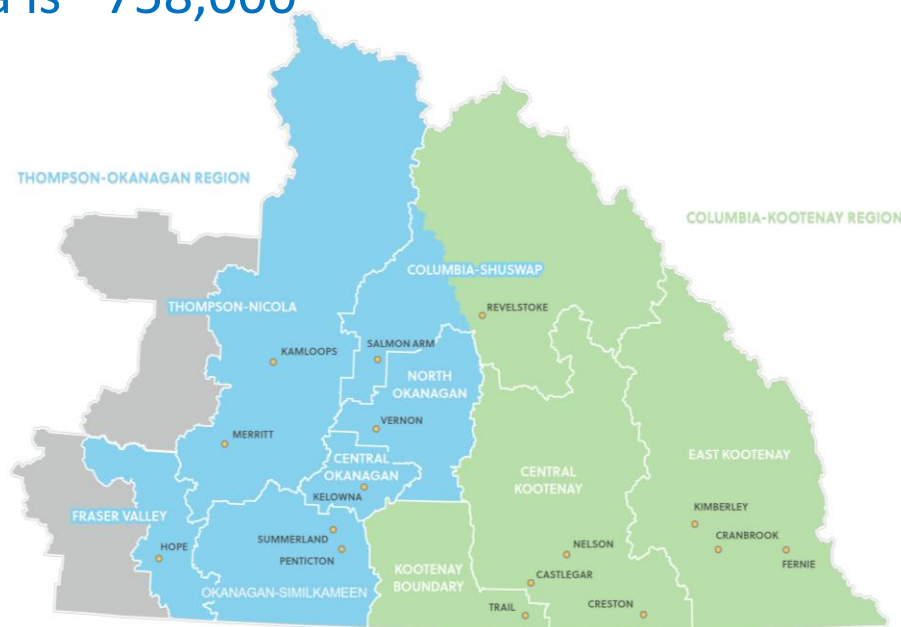
Strong economy Stronger communities

 - 5 in the CK-RAC area

Strategic Pillars



Requirements for All Applicants

Applicants must:

- Be located in the ETSI-BC service area
- Be financially solvent and current with annual federal and/or provincial filings
- Have no more than two approved projects in the last 4 consecutive intakes – no outstanding project reports
- Not exceed a combined grant total of \$75,000 per intake in any one community

**These requirements apply to all funding streams*

Funding Stream Details

Building Economic Development Capacity

Objectives – Building Ec Dev Capacity



- Enhance the capacity of rural & First Nations communities
- Support local or regional economic development projects
- Encourage collaboration and strategic partnerships
- Act as a first-in funder to leverage additional funding

Who Can Apply?



- Local governments, (municipalities and regional districts) and associated economic organizations
- First Nations Communities and their economic development corporations
- Non-profit business support organizations
- Local/Regional Industry Associations*
- Accelerators

**Applicants must be located in the ETSI-BC service area*

Project Type: Small Scale



- Max grant \$25,000
- Support for research and planning projects
- Communities with pop. <7,500 are eligible for 100% funding
- Communities with pop. >7,500 are eligible for 50% funding
- Multiple applications from the same community that combined exceed \$25,000 will be deemed large scale applications

Project Type: Large Scale



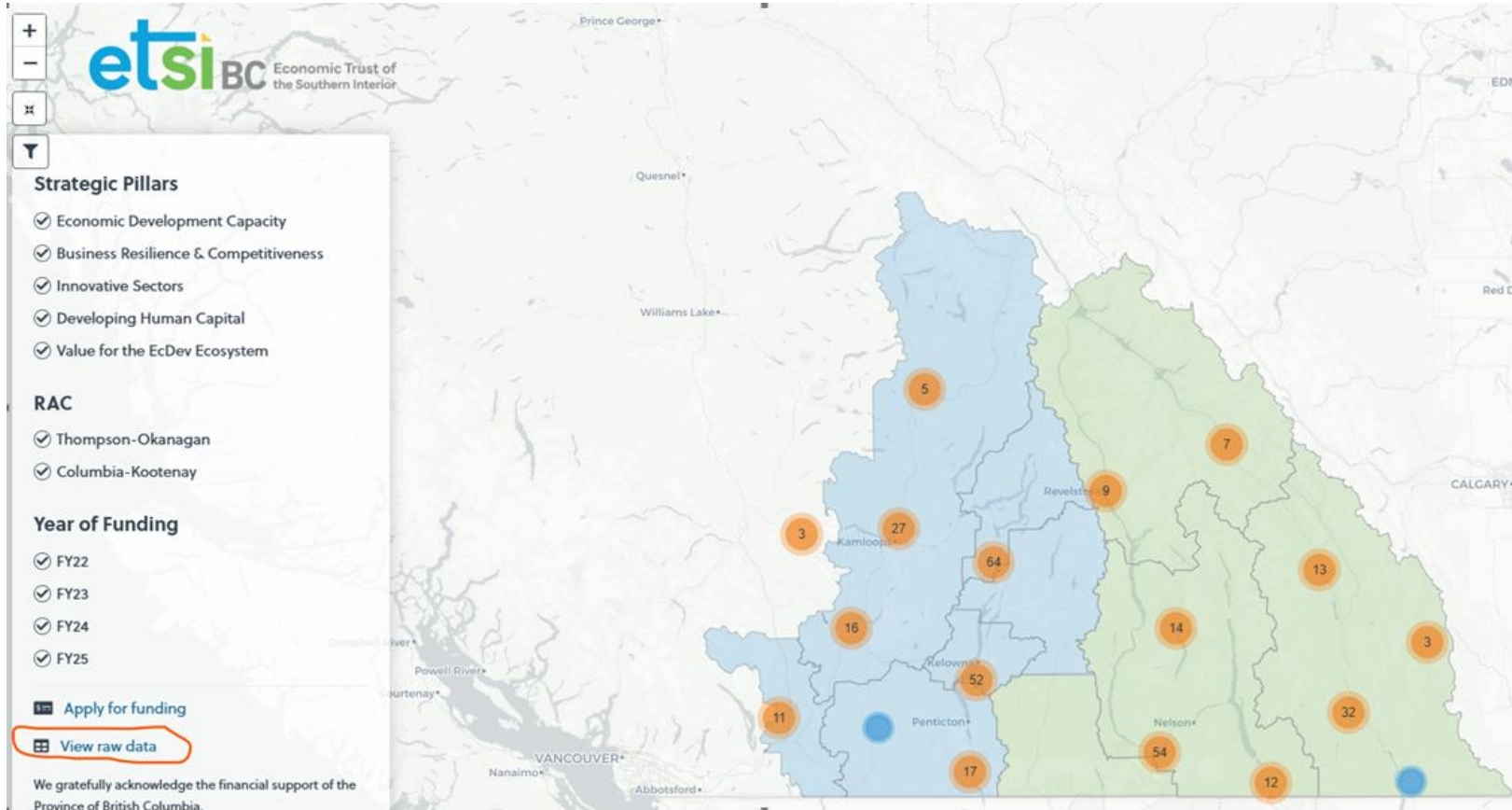
- Max grant \$75,000
- Support to assess, initiate or implement economic development projects
- Applicants may receive up to 50% funding of project budget (inc. small communities)
- Applicants must have a financial contribution to the project
- See Application Guide Section 6 - Project Leveraging

Project Type: Collaborative/Regional



- Max grant \$75,000
- Support to assess, initiate or implement economic development projects with regional impact
- Priority given to collaborative projects with First Nations and local/regional governments
- Applicants may receive *up to 60% funding* of project budget
- Collaborative partners must each contribute financially to the project
- Projects must demonstrate collaboration of two or more partners, have a regional focus and impact more than one community

Funding Terms



INNOVATING
& Advancing
Key Sectors

- Maximum grant \$75,000
- Applicants may receive *up to 60% funding* of the total project budget
- Applicants must financially contribute at least 25% of the project budget
- In-kind contributions may not exceed 10% of the ETSI-BC grant request
- Priority given to projects with higher leveraging

Navigating the Application



Application Tip 1 – *Prepare*

- Read the [Application Guides](#) (updated July 2026)
- Look at the [Stories page](#) of our website for inspiration & ideas
- Discuss project with your community economic development organization(s)
- [**Talk to us before starting an application!**](#)



Application Tip 2 – *Project Rationale*



- Have a clear project rationale (limit 300 words)
 - Describe the opportunity or challenge and reference prior work?
 - What is the methodology and expected economic result?
- Don't regurgitate ETSI-BC's priorities
- Avoid overuse of AI tools.

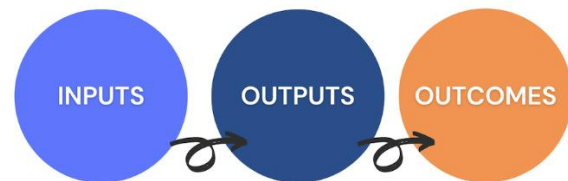
Application Tip 3 – *Project Type and Scope*

- Ensure that the project builds capacity – does more than your usual business activities
- Only submit one application per organization
- Consider whether you can do the project with less funding. If you receive less, what can still be done?



Application Tip 4 – *Metrics and Budget*

- Use clear, measurable economic metrics - how will you know the project is successful?
- Identify the number of jobs created and/or maintained by your project (there will always be jobs maintained)
- Leverage from other funders
- If possible, include quotes from contractors or consultants
- Admin fee - max 10% of funding
- Budget round numbers (not \$20,498.36)



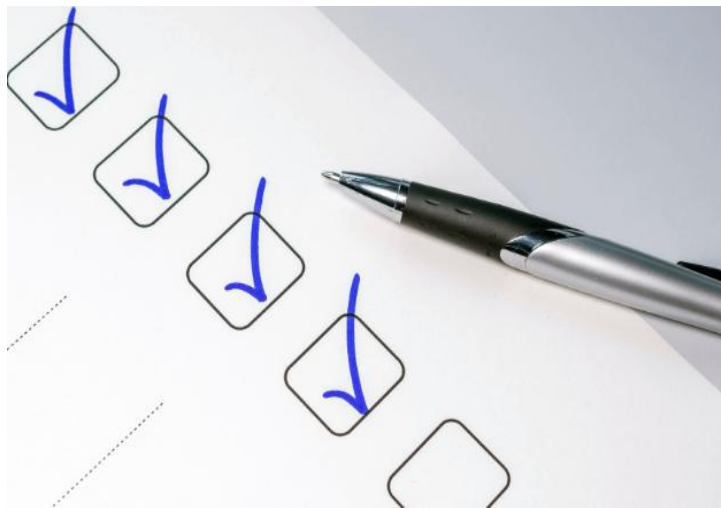
Application Tip 5 – *Workplan*

- Project must start after funding approval
- Any activities prior to funding approval are ineligible for funding
- Outputs (# mtgs) vs outcomes (# bus trained)
- Put “Final Report to ETSI-BC” as last workplan activity – be realistic
- Identify the signatory to the project application – not the consultant



Application Tip 6 – *Supporting Information*

- Letter support from the economic development organization if you are not the primary economic organization for your community
- Unique letters of support – not a template
- Partners are *active* project participants
- Append relevant studies or reports
- Review Applicant Conflict of Interest Policy

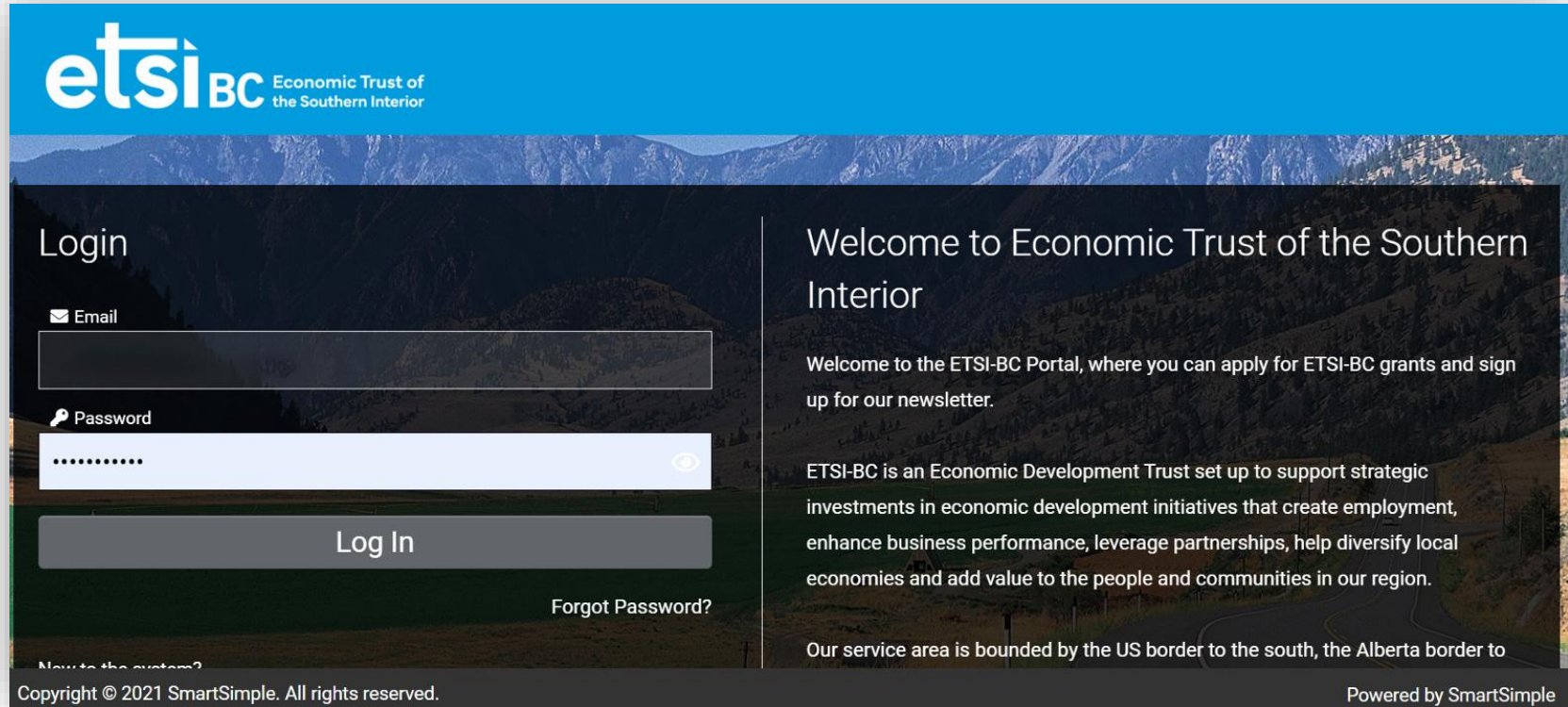

- Local Economic Impact Research
- Direct Support for Local Economic Recovery Projects
- Proactive Business Disaster Preparedness
- Strategic Gap-filling and Leverage

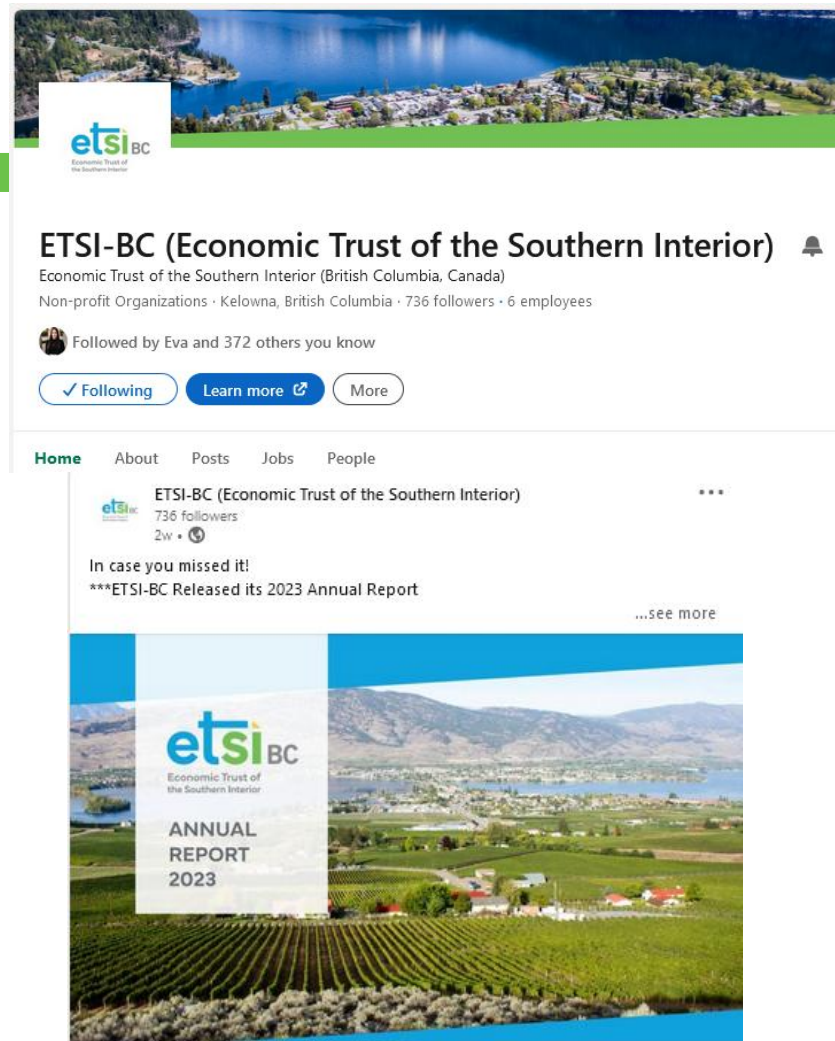
