Pillar 1 Project Focus



- Enhance the capacity of small/rural/First Nations communities to fulfill their ED aspirations and goals
- Support local and regional economic development projects
- Facilitate strategic partnerships and encourage regional collaboration between communities

Pillar 1: Who Can Apply ?

- Local governments (indigenous and non-indigenous), including regional districts
- Economic development organizations
- Non-profit business support organizations
- Industry Associations / Co-operatives
- Business Accelerators

*Applicants must be located in the ETSI-BC service area

Project Types: Small Scale

Purpose: economic development capacity for research and planning

- For communities with <25,000 residents
- Max grant \$15,000
- Projects in communities with < 5,000 residents are eligible for 100% funding
- Projects in communities with 5-25K residents may receive 50% funding

Examples of Small Scale Projects

- Economic development planning/research
(e.g. community branding, downtown revitalization, broadband access)
- Business retention/attraction strategies
(e.g. business walks, community engagement)
- Business diversification
(e.g. supply chain analysis)
- Industry/workforce engagement
(e.g. workforce analysis, attraction strategy)

Project Types: Large Scale

Purpose: To assess, initiate or implement economic development projects

- Max grant \$50,000
- Applicants may receive up to 50% funding of project budget
- Applicants must have a financial contribution to the project

Examples of Large Scale Projects

- Business Diversification
(e.g. capital investment analysis; business attraction campaign)
- Sector Development
(e.g. co-working space, food hub, supply chain development)
- Community Revitalization
(e.g. shop local campaign, downtown beautification program, improve a community-use facility)

Project Types: Collaborative/Regional

Purpose: To assess, initiate or implement an economic development project with regional impact

- Max grant \$50,000
- Priority given to collaborative projects with First Nations and local/regional government
- Applicants may receive up to 60% funding of project budget
- Collaborative partners must each contribute financially to the project

Collaborative/Regional Project Examples

- business diversification
- industry sector development
- community revitalization
- with a regional focus and impact
(e.g. major capital investment analysis,
regional business attraction initiative)

Pillar 3 Project Focus



- Encourage initiatives in support of innovation at regional or sector level
- Improve competitiveness by supporting sector-based initiatives, collaboration and partnerships
- Support industry to improve environmental sustainability and transition to a Net Zero economy
- Support initiatives that which focus on reducing environmental impacts of businesses

Funding Limit and Terms



INNOVATING
& Advancing
Key Sectors

- Maximum grant \$50,000
- Applicants may receive up to 75% funding of the total project budget
- Applicants must financially contribute the remaining 25% of the project budget – in-kind contribution cannot exceed 10% of project budget
- Priority given to projects with higher leveraging

Project Examples

- Film commission workforce attraction project
- Tourism strategic plan
- Cleantech study
- Outdoor gear industry association supply chain study to on-shore manufacturing
- Logging industry member support
- Regional agriculture initiatives

Application Tips

- Read the [Application Guides](#) for each Funding Stream
- Review the [list of funded projects](#) from last year on our website
- Look at the [Stories](#) page of our website for inspiration & ideas
- Have a clear project rationale –why is your project important, what economic outcomes are expected, how you're qualified
- Need support from the economic development entity in your community—'real' letters of support, not from a template
- Clear, measurable economic metrics—must include jobs created/maintained
- Leverage other funding, include quotes from contractors

Elements of ETSI-BC Funding Decisions


1. Evaluation/scoring criteria set by ETSI-BC Board
2. Due diligence by ETSI-BC Grant Team
3. Review and recommendation by ETSI-BC Regional Advisory Committees
4. Approval/conditional approval by CEO

Application/Decision Timelines

April 1, 2022	Spring Funding Intake opens
May 1, 2022 @ 4 pm	Funding Intake closes
May 2 – 31	Due Diligence/ applicant follow up
June 17	RAC review
June 27 – 30	Applicants advised/contribution agreements signed
